Blackberries: Supplies are currently very limited, but availability is expected to improve once Mexico ramps up production in late September.

Blueberries: Pacific Northwest season is ending due to weather and school demand, with a production gap until Central Mexico, Baja, and Peru start in late September or early October.

Strawberries: Salinas and Watsonville are experiencing lower yields due to heat-related quality issues. Santa Maria has begun producing small volumes of new crop, which should increase next week and help alleviate current strong demand.

Broccoli: Supplies are tight across all regions, with quality expected to be fair to good. A slight market increase is anticipated heading into the weekend.

Cauliflower: Recent weather in Salinas has favored insect growth, causing damage to some cauliflower crops. Supplies are expected to remain tight through next week.

Oranges: Markets are strengthening with high school demand, but Valencia supplies are low. Available in Central Valley (56ct+) and Riverside (88ct). Offshore navels or other fruits like apples and grapes are alternatives. Domestic Navels start in mid to late October.

Green Onions: Will be very limited for the next couple of weeks due to supply issues in Mexico caused by high temperatures.

Iceberg Lettuce: Market is firming up with low inventories, average weights of 39-44 pounds, and varying prices.

WEATHER



CALIFORNIA

After another hot day, temperatures will steadily cool through the weekend. Morning lows will range from the mid 40s to low 60s. Coastal daytime highs will be in the mid 60s to low 70s today, dropping to the low 60s by Friday. In the coastal valleys, temperatures will peak in the low 80s to 90 today, then fall to the mid 70s to mid 80s by Saturday. South of Soledad, expect highs in the low 90s to 100 on Wednesday and upper 80s to low 90s on Sunday.



MEXICO

Isolated showers and thunderstorms will persist through the beginning of the month, with rainfall totals typically between 0.02" and 0.20", though some thunderstorms may bring higher amounts. Temperatures are expected to remain seasonably warm through the weekend, with highs in the upper 70s to upper 80s and lows ranging from the mid 50s to mid 60s across the region.



FLORIDA

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Potato White Blush

As new crop potato harvests begin in the Pacific Northwest, storage supplies will quickly wind down over the next few days. Some of these supplies are showing their age with air cracks and pressure bruising more prevalent on these final pack outs. These are fairly common problems in the waning storage supplies due to constant contact with the weight of adjacent potatoes in storage.

Washington harvests continue this week with generally good quality, however, the size profile is on the small side in these early harvests as Idaho joins the mix this week. These new crop Norkotah harvests will yield mostly #1 grade potatoes with very little #2 or process grade in these early harvests.

Until these new crop potatoes have a chance to cure in storage, these supplies tend to show occasional feathering or skinning (abrasions from harvesting and handling) and excess moisture may be evident. These conditions can lead to the formation of white blush on freshly harvested potatoes. Steps can be taken to prevent or reduce the formation of white blush.

- Proper Handling: Handle potatoes with care to minimize damage to their skin as damaged areas are more prone to moisture loss and white blush.
- Ventilation: Ensure proper ventilation in the storage area to prevent excess moisture buildup which can contribute to white blush.
- Storage conditions: Store potatoes in a cool, dark and humid environment. Humidity will help the potatoes maintain their natural moisture content and reduce the likelihood of white blush formation.
- Regular Monitoring: Check your potatoes regularly and use those with a white blush sooner rather than later to prevent excessive starch buildup.



It is important to remember that white blush is a cosmetic issue and does not affect the taste, texture or overall quality of the potato.
