

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Production from Peru and Mexico is limited due to cold temperatures in Mexico and heat-related quality issues in Peru, with markets on both coasts expected to remain high for the next month.

Cantaloupe: Offshore melons are in limited supply due to vessel delays, holiday port schedules, and Tropical Storm Sara, with triggered pricing expected through December. Relief from Honduras and Costa Rica is not expected until late December or early next year. Quality remains excellent, with minimal cosmetic issues, while Mexican melons from Nogales are limited in size and availability.

Honeydew: Prices are elevated due to limited supply from Tropical Storm Sara's impact on fields, with additional offshore supplies expected later in the month. Mexican volume is very limited, and larger honeydews are peaking in size.



DECEMBER 24, 2024 CROP UPDATES

Melon supplies are limited due to reduced yields from Tropical Storm Sara and a virus in Guatemala, with increased demand and port delays driving prices higher. Relief is not expected until January, and a potential port strike could worsen the shortage. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - Warm temperatures will continue through Tuesday, with highs in the 70s to low 80s, cooling to the 60s and 70s by Thursday, while morning lows drop from the upper 30s to mid 40s, reaching the upper 20s to mid 30s by Thursday.

California - Showers may linger Monday morning, with clearing before more rain arrives Monday night, and cooler temperatures through the week, with totals of ½" to 1" through Tuesday and additional rain expected Wednesday through Friday.

Florida - Shower activity will increase by midweek as a cold front stalls over the state, with rain totals between 0.02" and 0.20", and a slight chance of morning frost in northern Florida on Monday before milder temperatures arrive.

Mexico -

Mornings will cool with an increased chance of frost later in the week, lows in the 30s to 40s, highs in the 60s to 70s, and mostly dry conditions with light, isolated showers through December 27th.

FREIGHT

Quiet week with Christmas this week, which will give way to a busier weekend after Christmas. We expect both sides of the supply chain to be light on labor, and that would include truck drivers.





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Apples

The apple market is expected to remain steady throughout December. Smaller foodservice sizes will stay tight across most varieties, as pack-out size profiles continue to peak on larger sizes, especially in Granny Smith and Fuji apples. With schools closed for the holidays, lighter demand should help keep prices stable.

Avocados

Markets remain steady, with the size curve skewed toward smaller fruit, which is more readily available, while larger fruit remains limited. Pricing is softer for smaller sizes but continues to hold strong for larger fruit. As the season progresses and harvests shift to higher elevations, fruit sizing is expected to improve by year-end. The industry anticipates strong supplies from Mexico through the remainder of the year, presenting excellent promotional opportunities for smaller fruit.

Bell Peppers

Gas times are around 24 hours, and Brix levels are holding steady at 12-13, signaling a strong season for foodservice. Domestic mandarins have also started shipping.

The market for melons is tight, and triggered pricing has been activated on some items, expected to remain through December. Relief from Honduras and Costa Rica is not anticipated until late December or early next year. Quality remains excellent on offshore melons, with minimal cosmetic issues, while Mexican fruit from Nogales is limited in size and availability.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A few showers may linger Monday morning, with skies briefly clearing before the next system arrives Monday night. Morning lows will range from the upper 30s to mid 50s, with daytime highs between the mid 50s and low 70s. Light to moderate showers will begin Monday night and continue through midnight Tuesday, with rainfall totals between ½" and 1". Skies will clear Tuesday night, bringing overnight lows to the upper 20s to low 30s south of King City and mid 30s to mid 40s elsewhere. The next round of rain is expected to start Wednesday night and continue through the end of the week, with total rainfall between ¼" and ¾".



MEXICO

Mornings will cool slightly, with an increased chance of frost for the latter half of the week. Lows will range from the upper 30s to mid 40s on Monday and Tuesday mornings, dropping to the low 30s to low 40s from Wednesday through Friday. As mentioned, ground-level temperatures may reach freezing in some areas. Daytime highs will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s throughout the week. Any shower activity will be light and isolated, so expect mostly dry conditions through December 27th.



FLORIDA

Shower activity will increase by midweek as a cold front moves south and stalls over the state through the end of the week. Rain totals will range from 0.02" to 0.20". A slight chance of morning frost is expected in northern Florida on Monday, followed by milder temperatures moving into the region.



ARIZONA

A prolonged period of warm temperatures will continue through Tuesday, with a dry cold front arriving Wednesday morning. Highs will range from the mid 70s to low 80s on Monday and Tuesday, cooling to the 60s to low 70s by Thursday. Morning lows in Dome, Roll, and Wenden will be in the upper 30s through Tuesday, dropping to the upper 20s to mid 30s by Thursday. Larger valleys in Yuma County, central Arizona, and southeast California will experience lows in the 40s through midweek, cooling to the upper 30s to mid 40s by Friday.


Grop Updates


Melon shippers are currently facing increased demand while supplies are limited, especially for Cantaloupe and Honeydews, which are at a "demand exceeds supply" status. Offshore melon yields have decreased by 30-50% due to the impact of Tropical Storm Sara, which hit the Central American melon-growing regions in mid-November. Guatemala fields are struggling with a virus, further limiting yields.

Costa Rica and Honduras, which are expected to begin production in early January, will also face challenges like Guatemala due to the storm's severe impact on those regions.

Honeydew production is facing difficulties due to lower yields from Mexico. Due to increased demand and limited supply, market rates are expected to rise, with immediate relief unlikely.

The melon shortage is primarily supply-driven, with limited open market opportunities. Port congestion has caused vessel delays, making forecasts unreliable. PRO*ACT's suppliers and logistics providers are closely monitoring the potential for a port strike, which could further exacerbate the melon shortage.





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
