

Strawberries: Demand exceeds supply in California, Baja, Central Mexico, and Florida, with significant supply increases not expected until late December.

Carrots: Bakersfield harvest continues through February, with tight supply and smaller sizing due to extreme summer heat. Allocations may be needed.

Cantaloupe: Domestic season has ended, and offshore melons face delays and limited availability. Pricing remains elevated through December. Relief expected from Honduras and Costa Rica by late December.

Tomatoes: Florida's tomato production is limited due to storm damage, improving by mid-December. Baja and Central Mexico have inconsistent roma production, with increased grape tomato volumes expected by mid-December. Supply should improve in January as Sinaloa ramps up.



DECEMBER 4, 2024 CROP UPDATES

Carrot supplies are tight in California due to extreme heat affecting growth, with smaller sizes and lighter yields. Georgia's Lake Park region also faced delays from Hurricane Helene, resulting in light production. Both areas expect improved supplies soon. Florida's strawberry production was delayed by hurricanes, with small berries expected to improve as new fields begin production. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - Warmer-than-average temps and dry conditions will persist across the low deserts this week. Light lettuce icing is possible in Mohawk Valley Wed-Thu, with lows in the 30s, while Yuma County will see lows in the 40s. Highs will be in the mid-70s to low 80s, with Coachella Valley reaching the low 80s. Northerly winds will increase Friday, with gusts of 15-20 mph.

<u>California</u> - Expect cool mornings and warm afternoons, with highs in the 60s to 70s and lows in the 30s to 40s. Offshore winds will raise lows, and a northern low Sunday will cool highs to the low 60s.

Florida -Frost conditions are impacting areas from the FL/Georgia border to Brooksville, FL, but will ease by Thursday into Saturday, except in sheltered northern Florida areas. Daytime temps will stay cool today, warm up Thursday, then drop again for the weekend.

<u>Mexico</u> - Temperatures will stay seasonal, with dry weather through Friday and a chance of showers by Saturday. Rainfall totals will be 0.02" to 0.20" by Sunday. Highs will be in the 70s to 80s, and lows will be in the 40s to 50s through Sunday.

FREIGHT

Expect truck capacity to be fairly good for the next three weeks, and prior to Christmas. Great growing weather in the west coast regions will help transit times.

Apples

The apple market remains steady with ample supplies overall. Certain varieties, like Cosmic Crisp and Fuji, are skewing larger, with packouts favoring sizes 80s and 88s, while smaller sizes like 125s and 138s are limited. However, smaller Granny Smith apples are becoming more readily available. These trends may shift as the season advances.

<u>Asparagus</u>

With cooler weather, Mexican asparagus production remains limited. Caborca is anticipating a delayed start in 2025, potentially beginning in the first or second week of February, depending on weather conditions. Mexican supplies are expected to remain tight, while Peruvian imports are helping meet demand but remain constrained, particularly for larger sizes. Markets on both coasts are likely to stay slightly elevated in the coming weeks.

Avocados

Markets are stable, with a predominance of small fruit and limited availability of larger sizes. Pricing remains lower for smaller fruit, while larger sizes continue to command stronger prices. As the season progresses and fruit matures, the size curve is expected to shift, with harvests moving to higher elevations. Mexico is expected to provide strong supplies through year-end, offering excellent opportunities to promote small fruit.




Melon (Cantaloupe)

ALERT

The domestic cantaloupe season has concluded, and offshore melons have been impacted by holiday delays and port congestion. As a result, there is a focus on contracted business, with limited market melons available. Triggered pricing has been activated on some items and is expected to remain in place throughout December. Relief from Honduras and Costa Rica is not expected until late December or early next year. Quality remains excellent on offshore melons with minimal cosmetic concerns, while Mexican fruit from Nogales is limited in sizing and availability due to the October heatwave in Mexico, which has caused smaller fruit to be in higher demand and some growers to end their seasons early.

Grop Undates

Carrot supplies from California look to remain on the tight side for the near term as harvests transition to the Bakersfield region of Central California. This region received very warm temperatures with over 2 months of temperatures above 100 degrees during the planting and early growth stage.

These extreme temperatures impacted growth rates and early crop development in the fields. Harvests are producing a smaller size structure and lighter yields in these early stands.

The Lake Park region of Southern Georgia was impacted by Hurricane Helene that interrupted normal planting schedules in the region. Many growers had to replant following the storm resulting in delays of nearly 2 months. The region has begun very light production from the acreage that survived the hurricane with smaller size structure and lighter yields. Carrot growers in both regions are hoping to get back on track in the next few weeks as new fields begin production.

Strawberry growers in the Plant City region of Northern Florida were also impacted by Hurricanes Helene and Milton and had to delay their plantings by 3-4 weeks. The region has started very light production from fields that survived the hurricanes with small berries in the 25-30 count range. Growers are expecting improved size and quality as new fields begin production in the next couple of weeks.
