

#### **MARKET ALERTS**

Asparagus - Supply is tight due to high temperatures in Southern Baja and Peru. With increased demand before the 4th of July, supplies will remain tight through next week.

Avocado - On June 14, 2024, the USDA suspended avocado harvesting in Michoacan, Mexico, due to road-blocking protests. Two USDA inspectors were detained but safely returned. Harvesting efforts are ongoing, but the pipeline remains dry, and suppliers are in Force Majeure until mid-July.

<u>Brussel Sprouts</u> - Brussels sprouts are in short supply due to warm weather in Mexico, causing discoloration and more bugs. The market is expected to rise next week.

Lemons - 165ct and smaller will be tight all summer. The 140ct and smaller market remains strong. Offshore winds in mid-July will aid domestic lemon farmers.

Limes - Prices are rising due to lower inventories and rain delays in harvesting. The rain is beneficial long-term but causing a short-term price spike.

Oranges - Navels are nearly finished; Valencia's are now the main variety. Valencias are available in the Central Valley and Riverside, with a 12 brix range.

<u>Garlic</u> - There is still a limited amount of garlic produced in Mexico of fair quality.

<u>Lettuce Tender Leaf</u> - Limited supply of tender leaf items like cilantro and Italian parsley due to recent rains causing bacterial spotting.

### JULY 3, 2024

#### **CROP UPDATES**

Heatwaves are expected across the lower Mississippi Valley, Gulf Coast, California, and Southwest, with temperatures reaching the upper 90s to low 100s. Elevated humidity and a strong high-pressure ridge will extend the heatwave, breaking daily records. Excessive heat warnings are issued, and harvesting hours in San Joaquin, Santa Maria, and Salinas Valleys will be curtailed due to worker safety concerns. Read more

#### **WEATHER**

Arizona - High pressure will bring near-average temperatures through Thursday and above average temperatures on Friday, with lows in the mid-70s to 80s, and temperatures ranging from 106 to 116 degrees.

<u>California</u> - Temperatures will reach full heat wave levels away from the coast on Tuesday, while at the coast, they will remain slightly above average due to the shallow marine layer. Morning lows will range from mid-50s to upper 60s, with gusts up to 30 mph.

Florida - Northern Florida is expected to experience isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms due to a stalled frontal boundary, with temperatures remaining warm through July 5th.

<u>Mexico</u> - Intermittent showers and thunderstorms through July 4th, causing 0.05" to 0.25" rainfall, with isolated showers on Friday and Saturday. Temperatures slightly warmer through July 6th.

#### **FREIGHT**

Freight this week contends with 4th of July Holiday markets. We anticipate an slow return of capacity into the week of the 8th as drivers return from vacation and time with family.



# IN PEAK SEASON

<u>Honeydew</u> - As we transition from the desert to the Central Valley, the honeydew market stays tight.

**Pears** - Most Washington shippers are sold out of domestic pears, except for limited quantities of Anjou, Bosc, and Red Anjou. Bartletts are now available on both coasts.

<u>Pineapple</u> - Spot market opportunities are limited as suppliers prioritize contracts. Tropical weather has accelerated fruit maturation, reducing yields.

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#### **Apples**

Apple supplies remain strong. In July, some holes in inventories are likely to appear. Pinks, honeys, and golds will thin out. Galas will remain tight. This summer, reds, granny smiths, and Fuji will be plentiful.

#### <u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

The asparagus supply remains tight. Leading up to the 4th of July holiday, many retailers are taking ad volume. Southern Baja has been experiencing temperatures above 100 degrees for about a week, which has caused asparagus to go dormant. There is also more smaller sizing than larger sizes as a result. As a result of the warm weather, Peru is also producing less asparagus. Supplies will remain tight through next week.

#### <u>Avocados</u>

ALERT

As of Friday, June 14, 2024, the USDA suspended avocado harvesting and shipments from Michoacan, Mexico, due to a social protest blocking roads in Aranza. Two USDA inspectors were detained but safely returned to Uruapan. USDA and Mexican authorities are working to resume harvesting. The pipeline remains dry, and suppliers are in Force Majeure as of July 3rd. This will continue for the next two weeks until the situation stabilizes.

#### **Bell Peppers**

#### **CALIFORNIA**

Temps will reach full heat wave levels away from the coast Tuesday and last through the rest of the week. At the coast, temperatures will remain near to slightly above average due to the shallow marine layer. Lows in the morning will range from the mid-50s to the upper 60s, while daytime highs will range from the mid-60s to the upper 70s near the coast, from the upper 80s to 100 in the coastal valleys, and from 105-113 south of Soledad. With gusts up to 30 mph, there will be a blustery sea breeze.



#### **MEXICO**

Showers and thunderstorms will occur intermittently through July 4th. Most showers will produce 0.05" to 0.25" of rainfall, but some thunder-storms may produce higher totals. It is more likely that shower activity will become isolated over the area on Friday and Saturday. Through July 6th, temperatures will be slightly warmer and closer to normal.



#### **FLORIDA**

A stalled frontal boundary will cause isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms over northern Florida on Monday and Tuesday. By the end of the week, showers and thunder-storms will continue to develop over the state due to daytime heating and daytime heating. Most showers will produce rain totals between 0.02" and 0.20", but thunderstorms may produce higher totals. Through July 5th, temperatures will remain warm over the state.



#### **ARIZONA**

High pressure continues to bring near-average temperatures through Thursday and well above average temperatures beginning Friday, as monsoonal moisture remains south and east. Tuesday's morning lows will be in the mid 70s to mid 80s, and Saturday's lows will be in the upper 70s to upper 80s. Temperatures will range from 106 to 116 degrees Tuesday, increasing a few degrees each day until reaching 112-123 degrees on Friday.





The heat is on, from the lower Mississippi Valley and the Gulf Coast to California and the Southwest. Temperatures are forecast to soar into the upper 90s to low 100s across the lower Mississippi Valley through midweek. When combined with elevated humidity levels heat indices are expected to rise into the 110s across the region including the Gulf Coast. A strong high-pressure ridge out west will bring an extended extreme heatwave to California and the Southwest through the Holiday week and into the weekend. Temperatures away from the immediate coastline are forecast to reach into the 100-110F range, likely breaking numerous daily records especially in the interior valleys. The duration of this heat wave is concerning with excessive heat warnings issued throughout much of the state. These hot temperatures will curtail harvesting hours in the San Joaquin, Santa Maria and Salinas Valleys due to worker safety issues.




Many crops are in the line of fire in the Salinas and Santa Maria Valleys. Lettuce and romaine supplies will likely see an increase in fringe burn, internal burn, seed discoloration and insect pressure along with lesser texture and shelf life. Tender leaf, spinach, spring mix, parsley and cilantro crops are especially susceptible to these extreme temperatures. Bolting/seeders, yellowing, fringe burn, tip burn, insect damage, wilting and a generally thin/weaker texture will be common in these stands. Broccoli and cauliflower will likely see and increase discoloration, sunscald, hollow core, brown beadpin rot and overall lesser texture. This heat will not help the already very light broccoli supplies in the near term.





Hurricane Beryl currently in the Caribbean Sea became the first Category 4 storm to form in June with winds reaching 150mph before becoming the earliest category 5 system ever with winds reaching 160+mph. Beryl is expected to move across the Caribbean reaching the Yucatan Peninsula late this week moving into the Gulf of Mexico on Saturday likely as a Tropical Storm. This storm bears watching this week as the track and intensity becomes clearer as it approaches the warm water in the Gulf of Mexico this weekend.
