Commodity of the Month - Onions



MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus - Mexico's production is improving across all sizes, Peru's cool weather supports good production, and Washington's season ends this week with Michigan's ending next week. Combined Peruvian, Mexican, and domestic supplies are keeping markets steady.

Avocado - On June 14, 2024, the USDA suspended avocado harvesting and shipments due to a social protest in Aranza, Michoacán, which blocked roads and detained a USDA inspector's vehicle. USDA inspectors were safely returned to Uruapan, and discussions with Mexican authorities are ongoing to resume harvesting. Current supplies will dwindle as no new harvests occur, causing market prices to rise. Suppliers are divided on when force majeure should take effect.

Broccoli - Broccoli supplies are low in Salinas, Santa Maria, and Mexico due to quality issues like pin rot, yellow beads, hollow cores, and decay. Harvesters are leaving affected heads behind, and Mexico's production is further reduced by warm weather and recent hailstorms.

Lemons - Larger fruits (115ct and up) are peaking, smaller sizes (165ct and below) are scarce, and District 2 (Oxnard/Ventura County) is now the main producer. Early July offshore weather will aid domestic lemon growers.

CROP UPDATES

The active weather patterns continue to impact production and quality across the U.S. and Mexico as we move into summer. Out west the heat wave continues in the interior valleys of California and the Southwest as the strong high-pressure ridge remains in place. Temperatures look to peak over the weekend with some relief expected around the middle of next week. [Read more](#)

WEATHER

Arizona - The high-pressure ridge returns and winds decrease, causing steady warming through the weekend. Highs rise to 108-114, lows in the 60s-70s, and isolated high elevation showers possible near Maricopa Co.

California - High pressure weakens the marine layer, causing temperatures to be near-average. Lows range from 40s to 50s, with highs in the 60s to 70s near the coast, 70s to 80s in coastal valleys, and 80s to 100 degrees inland.

Florida - Isolated showers through Thursday, increased chances of showers and t-storms on Friday through Sunday, with a strengthening low in the Atlantic approaching the east coast of FL/SE US.

Mexico - Tropical system in Gulf of Mexico will bring increased moisture, with showers and t-storms likely by Thursday evening, resulting in 0.50" to 1.00" of rain.

FREIGHT

Asparagus

ALERT

Asparagus supplies will be very light for the next couple of weeks leading into the 4th of July. Many retailers are taking ad volume leading into the holiday. Southern Baja has seen about a week of temps above 100 degrees causing asparagus to go dormant. This is also yielding more smaller sizing as opposed to larger sizing. Peru is also battling very warm weather as well and producing less asparagus. Look for this market to be tight through the 4th of July holiday.

Avocados

ALERT

On Friday, June 14, 2024, the USDA suspended avocado harvesting and shipments. In Aranza, Michoacán (Mexico's main avocado-growing region), roads were blocked by a social protest unrelated to avocado production. A USDA inspector's vehicle was detained. USDA security protocol was activated to protect inspectors. After safe transit, both inspectors returned to Uruapan, Michoacan. USDA staff members are working with Mexican authorities to resume harvesting as soon as possible. USDA and Mexican officials will meet this afternoon. While many suppliers have fruit en route that was shipped before the suspension, there is no harvest until an agreement is reached, so supplies will become scarcer. Mexican supplies are insufficient to fill the gap left by California and Peru. Markets will continue to increase until the suspension is lifted due to a shortage of fruit. Some suppliers want force majeure to take effect this week, others want it to take effect next week.

In Salinas, Santa Maria, and Mexico, broccoli is in short supply. Low yields caused by quality issues are driving overall lighter supplies. There are signs of pin rot, yellow beads, hollow cores, and decay reducing production in the fields. The majority of these quality issues are visible at harvest, and harvesters are leaving affected heads behind. As a result of the warmer weather and recent hailstorms, Mexico's supplies are also limited.

District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) is finished, leaving District 2 (Oxnard/Ventura County) to produce the largest fruit. The offshore weather on the West Coast is expected to come into play early July, providing some relief for domestic lemon growers.

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Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Throughout the weekend, high pressure weakens the marine layer and causes temperatures to be near to above average. Lows in the morning will range from the low 40s to mid 50s, with highs in the low 60s to low 70s near the coast, mid 70s to mid 80s in coastal valleys, and mid 80s to low 90s inland. Coastal valleys will experience low-mid 80s and inland will see upper 80s to 100 degrees as the high strengthens Friday. There will be a peak in the heat on Saturday before a slight cooling trend begins on Sunday.



MEXICO

A tropical system in the Gulf of Mexico, along with other humid air, will bring increased moisture into the region late tonight into Thursday. Showers and t-storms are more likely to develop by Thursday evening. Most of the region will receive 0.50" to 1.00" of rain. Some t-storms may produce higher totals. Shower activity will become more isolated to scattered by Friday and through the weekend.



FLORIDA

There will be isolated showers through Thursday, followed by a greater chance of showers and t-storms on Friday through Sunday. In the Atlantic, a low is also being monitored for strengthening as it approaches the east coast of FL/SE US on Friday and Saturday. Through the weekend, temperatures will remain warm.



ARIZONA

As a result of a return of the high-pressure ridge and decreased winds, a steady warming is expected through the weekend. By Sunday afternoon, the highs will rise from 103-105 in most fields to 108-114. Our morning lows will be in the upper 60s-low 70s for most today, warming to the low-mid 80s by Sunday morning. In the vicinity of Maricopa Co. on Sunday, some isolated high elevation showers are possible.

Crop Update



The active weather patterns continue to impact production and quality across the U.S. and Mexico as we move into summer. Out west the heat wave continues in the interior valleys of California and the Southwest as the strong high-pressure ridge remains in place. Temperatures look to peak over the weekend with some relief expected around the middle of next week.

Another heat wave will settle in across the Great Lakes, Ohio Valley, and the Northeast over the next few days. Widespread record to near record high temperatures is forecast with overnight lows only reaching the mid-70s providing little relief from the heat. These types of temperatures generally occur later in the summer months in the August/September time frame across these regions. Local/regional production is set to begin in the near future across the various production regions and these temperatures may impact supplies and quality when harvests begin.

A disturbance in the Gulf of Mexico will likely become the first Tropical Cyclone of the season before making landfall in Northeastern Mexico by early Thursday. Heavy rain and tropical-storm-force winds well north of the circulation are expected to move on shore across southern Texas today. Rainfall totals of 5-10 inches are possible from northeast Mexico into South Texas before tapering off by early Friday. This will bring much needed precipitation to Mexico which has been ravaged by drought. Of course, too much rain too fast can cause flooding, landslides and road closures depending on where and how much rain falls.

Back in California Growers remain ahead of schedule in many fields due to the cool spring temperatures holding back acreage causing growers to reach for supplies. Iceberg lettuce supplies while gradually improving remain on the light side for the near term. Cilantro and parsley production continues to be impacted by disease pressure and weather issues. Very hot temperatures are now expected to impact these fields in the near term. These tender items do not handle extreme heat well and supplies may once again feel the impact. Broccoli fields remain behind schedule mostly due to cool temperatures and growers reaching for product. Brown beads, discoloration and hollow core are also prevalent in the fields lessening yields and overall supplies for the mid-term. Supplies look to remain limited for the next couple of weeks at a minimum.

All these factors will keep overall supplies on the lighter side as we move through June.
