

MARKET ALERTS

Onions: Onion markets are active with strong demand, despite a slight holiday slowdown. Prices for white onions are expected to rise as the Northwest season progresses.

Tomatoes: Demand exceeds supply for tomatoes, with East Coast romas and rounds constrained until January. Grape tomatoes are tight but expected to improve by late December; Mexico's production will rise by mid-December.

Squash: Demand exceeds supply due to cooler weather and rain, affecting southern regions. Quality is good, but some damage is noted. Nogales supply is low; full production expected by December.

Lettuce Tender Leaf: Tender leaf products are in limited supply as production starts in Yuma, with elevated market prices expected.
Challenges include insect damage, inconsistent sizes, and leaf yellowing.

Celery: Most shippers see steady market conditions. Expect \$2-\$3 extra for Yuma transfers. Holiday demand has declined, but availability is good, with high-quality goods from Oxnard and Santa Maria.

Cauliflower: Supplies are tight this week due to the Salinas Valley finishing up, with Yuma production not yet ramped up. Prices are expected to remain high until next week.

Carrots: Harvest in Bakersfield runs until February, facing tight yields due to a hot summer and delays from hurricanes in Lake Park, Georgia. Submit snack pack orders 48 hours in advance.

CROP UPDATES

As Thanksgiving approaches, Southwestern Desert growers anticipate improved weather after a warm fall affected crop growth. Light yields and quality issues are expected, but forecasts predict drier conditions and a warming trend, potentially boosting December harvest quality. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - Warmer temperatures are expected this week, with gusty northerly winds of 17-22 mph on Wednesday and Thursday. Morning lows range from the mid 40s to low 50s, warming to the 70s during the day, then cooling again by Friday. Winds will calm by the weekend.

California - Light to moderate rain will continue through Wednesday night, with ¼" to ½" total expected. Morning temps range from mid 30s to low 50s and highs from mid 50s to mid 60s. A second system arrives late Thursday, bringing possible light rain through Saturday with totals up to ¾".

Broccoli: Broccoli supplies are tight due to cleanup in Salinas Valley, facing issues like mechanical damage and pests. Expect continued constraints.

Strawberries: The market faces a demandsupply gap worsened by cooler weather in California. Central Mexico boosts shipments, with Baja improving in December and Florida's harvest starting mid-December.

Florida - Milder mornings are expected through Thursday, followed by a cold front bringing cooler temperatures for the latter half of the week. After some sprinkles in northern Florida, mostly dry weather is predicted until November 30th.

<u>Mexico</u> - Central Mexico will experience cool mornings with potential frost in sheltered areas until Thursday. Lows will range from the mid 30s to mid 40s, while highs reach the mid 70s to upper 80s. No rain is expected in the next five days.

FREIGHT

This week sees loading delays from a slow berry harvest, but Yuma improvements help. We're monitoring South Texas and Florida's winter crops.



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Apples

The apple market is currently stable and well-stocked. However, certain varieties, notably Cosmic Crisp and Fuji, are seeing a predominance of larger sizes in their packouts. Sizes 125s and 138s are becoming increasingly scarce, while sizes 80s and 88s are more readily available. This situation could evolve as the season advances. Additionally, smallersized Granny Smith apples are becoming more accessible.

<u>Asparagus</u>

Mexican production from Southern and Northern Baja remains low due to seasonal factors. However, we anticipate that Caborca will begin its production in the coming weeks. Meanwhile, Peruvian volumes have stabilized and are expected to maintain this consistency over the next few weeks. The market has been particularly active for larger sizes, although overall activity is beginning to taper off as the holiday rush comes to an end.

Avocados

The markets are stable at the moment. Currently, the size distribution leans heavily towards smaller fruits, while larger fruits are in tighter supply. Consequently, prices for small fruits are lower, while large fruits maintain robust pricing. As we approach the end of the year, we anticipate an increase in size distribution as the fruit on the trees continues to mature and harvests transition to higher elevations. Additionally, the industry is expecting a solid supply flow from Mexico through the end of the year, presenting excellent opportunities for promotions focused on small fruits.

Bell Peppers

Georgia's harvest is nearing completion, and Florida is beginning to show promising signs of improvement, with even better conditions expected in the next three weeks. In the West, Coachella continues to provide a moderate supply of high-quality produce, while Nogales is steadily increasing its seasonal output. We anticipate that seasonal volumes will be consistent by early December. Meanwhile, supplies of red bell peppers remain limited, with no substantial relief in sight until January.

<u>Melon (Cantaloupe)</u>

Port delays are affecting schedules, and cold weather is impacting both domestic and Mexican production.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Light to moderate rain continues through Wednesday night as a slow-moving low pressure system traverses the area. Additional rainfall totals will be between $\frac{1}{4}$ " – $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Morning lows will be in the mid 30s to low 50s with daytime highs in the mid 50s to mid 60s. As skies clear Wednesday night, min temps drop to the upper 20s to low 30s south of King City with mid 30s to mid 40s elsewhere through Saturday morning. A second system arrives late Thursday with a chance of light rain through Saturday morning with additional rain totals up to $\frac{3}{4}$ ".



MEXICO

Cool mornings with the slight chance of some morning frost through Thursday morning over some of the wind-sheltered areas of Central Mexico. Lows in the mid 30s to mid 40s through Thursday and low-upper 40s for Friday and Saturday morning. Max temps in the mid 70s to mid 80s through Wednesday, upper 70s to upper 80s on Thursday and mostly mid 70s to mid 80s on Friday and Saturday afternoon. No rain over the next five days.



FLORIDA

Milder mornings through Thursday and then another cold front will bring much cooler temps again for the latter half of the week. Afternoon temps will be seasonal to start and see a dip on Friday and Saturday as cool dry air moves in behind the frontal passage. Beyond a few sprinkles over northern Florida today and Thursday, mostly dry weather is expected through Nov 30th.



ARIZONA

Warmer than normal temps expected through the week but northerly winds will strengthen Wednesday and Thursday with gusts of 17-22mph expected. Winds gradually subside into the weekend. Morning lows will be in the mid 40s-low 50s today, warming to mostly 50s Wednesday, cooling back to the mid 40s-low 50s by Friday. Look for highs in the 70s most fields.

Freight Updates

This week, we're experiencing some delays in loading due to a slower berry harvest. However, the transition in Yuma has been successfully completed, leading to improvements in loading times at the supplier level.

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As we approach the Thanksgiving Holiday growers are anticipating an improved weather pattern to take shape in the Southwestern Desert growing regions. After a very warm late summer and early fall the desert regions have seen a significant cool down and some light to moderate ice in the colder valleys. The heat in the desert region impacted germination and growth rates of many crops causing irregular head formation in leafy green fields across the region. Many of these early season stands are showing light yields and carton weights due to seeder, disease pressure and other quality issues. With the improved weather pattern expected into early December along lighter post-holiday demand growers are hoping for better solidity and overall quality in upcoming stands.

In the Salinas Valley significant precipitation this week will impact the late season artichokes and Cole crops (brussels sprouts broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower) in the valley. This will likely impact yields in the remaining acreage in the Salinas Valley putting more pressure on desert supplies next week. Long range forecasts keep the West Coast dry with a warming trend and no freezing temperatures in the desert locals which should help with overall yields and quality as we move into December harvests.







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
