

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Supplies are limited due to a port strike in Peru and high temperatures in Mexico, but improvements are expected by mid October.

Bell Peppers: Markets are rising slightly due to heavy rains in Georgia causing bloom drop and tighter supplies, while California pepper supplies are lighter and demand has increased prices.

Blackberries: Availability remains limited until Central Mexico improves yields, expected in the third week of October.

Blueberries: Availability will remain extremely limited until increased arrivals from Peru and Central Mexico in mid-October, with ongoing port closures impacting supply levels.

Strawberries: Mexican season is expected to start in mid to late November, while California's heat wave may impact quality and yields, potentially ending the Salinas and Watsonville growing seasons early.

Oranges: Markets are strengthening with extremely limited supplies, particularly of Valencias, ahead of the domestic navel season starting October 21st.

Green Onions: Supplies are extremely limited due to heat in northern Mexico, with tight availability expected to persist for the next few weeks.

Tomatoes: Hurricane Helene severely impacted Eastern Tennessee and Western North Carolina, nearly wiping out the Tennessee tomato season and raising concerns about volatile markets.

CROP UPDATES

Hurricane Helene caused significant damage from Florida to Tennessee, particularly in Tennessee and North Carolina, where flooding has devastated crops, especially tomatoes. Concerns are rising for upcoming harvests in Northern Florida and South Georgia. Early reports indicate minimal damage in Florida, but planting delays are expected. Further assessments will clarify the extent of the impact. Read more

WEATHER

<u>Arizona</u> - Temperatures may dip slightly today, but warmer-than-normal conditions will persist through the weekend, with highs reaching 100s and isolated spots reaching 110, with morning lows in the 70s.

<u>California</u> - The heat wave will gradually ease over the weekend, with temperatures remaining above average. Morning lows range from mid-50s to 70s, while daytime highs range from upper 70s to low 90s.

Florida -Showers are expected through tomorrow, with rainfall ranging from 0.02" to 0.20". From Friday to Sunday, wet weather increases due to moisture and a tropical disturbance. Heavy rainfall is possible, with highs in the mid-80s to near 90, cooling to the low to mid-80s.

<u>Mexico</u> - Temperatures will be slightly warmer and in line with seasonal averages through Friday, with highs in the low 70s to 80s and lows in the low 50s to near 60.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees a demand for truck in the Parma, ID region due to influx of new crop apples competing with Onions and Potato new crop. We expect this trend to improve as we approach storage season.



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Apples

The market remains mostly steady, with all major varieties now transitioning to the new crop, except for Pink Lady apples. While some storage crop inventories are still available, there is a limited supply of small-sized Granny Smith apples.

<u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

Asparagus supplies remain very limited on both coasts. Peru continues to face challenges due to a port strike, resulting in reduced shipments to the U.S. market. Additionally, high temperatures in Mexico are causing growth to go dormant, further constraining supplies. However, we anticipate improvements in availability by the second week of October.

Markets are showing a slight upward trend. As Canada, Michigan, and other local deals wrap up, Georgia has experienced over 12 inches of rain and strong winds, leading to bloom drop and anticipated tighter markets with notable gaps as we transition into fall. California pepper supplies are lighter, and increased demand has driven prices higher. While quality remains good, sizing has decreased. Red bell prices are holding steady at current levels.

However, we anticipate an increase in crossings from McAllen, TX, in the next two weeks.

Steady arrivals from Baja and Central Mexico are maintaining a flat market, with expectations for increased volumes as we approach late October. An uptick in transferred products is anticipated in the next 2 to 3 weeks, coinciding with the ramp-up of the Mexican strawberry season.

The Mexican season is expected to start in mid to late November. In California, a heat wave extending into the weekend is impacting quality and may soon negatively affect supplies. Due to heat advisories, crews will be working reduced hours, which could lead to lower yields. Such weather events, typically seen in October, may result in an earlier-than-usual conclusion for the Salinas and Watsonville growing areas, which normally continue into late October.

Both the Virginia and bulk pack categories should have extra capacity, making this an excellent opportunity for promotions.

Markets are strengthening, but supplies will be extremely limited for the next few weeks. Valencias are currently available in the Central Valley and Riverside areas, but contracts take priority, leading to allocation due to reduced supplies. Several shippers finished packing Valencias last week, further tightening supplies and driving up prices. Most shippers will gap before the domestic navel season begins on October 21st. Quality is fair, typical for this time of year, with reports of early decay, soft fruit, and skin breakdown due to the extreme heat. We'll keep you updated if any shippers can harvest earlier.

<u>Cucumber</u>



While there are minor reports of slight puffiness and misshapen heads, these issues are minimal. Several suppliers are accommodating volume-type orders, so we encourage you to promote as much as possible. However, anticipate that this market will tighten in the coming weeks.

Hurricane Helene significantly affected Eastern Tennessee and Western North Carolina, leading to the near-complete loss of the Tennessee tomato season and substantial losses in Western North Carolina. Comprehensive assessments are expected to be available early next week. Prices have risen at other loading points, including Texas, California, Nogales, and Baja. There are concerns about potential supply gaps, as Quincy and South Georgia usually help bridge the transition to the Florida season. As a result, expect volatile markets in the coming weeks, along with rain-related quality issues.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A weak low-pressure system moving north today will diminish high pressure and bring temperatures closer to average. Morning lows are expected to range from the mid 40s to upper 50s, with daytime highs reaching the 60s along the coast, mid 70s to low 80s in the coastal valleys, and mid 80s to low 90s south of King City. As the low system moves away, temperatures will rise above average again, peaking on Friday with maximums in the low to upper 70s near the coast and mid 80s to upper 90s inland. The high pressure will weaken over the weekend, cooling temperatures back to average under a deepening marine layer.



MEXICO

Warm seasonal temperatures are expected to persist with minimal changes through September 29th. Isolated shower activity will be generally light, with rain totals ranging from 0.02" to 0.20" in most instances, though some thunderstorms may produce higher amounts. Maximum temperatures will primarily be in the mid 70s to mid 80s through Thursday, dropping to the mid 70s to low 80s from Friday to Sunday. Overnight lows will range from the upper 50s to mid 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Later today through Thursday, Tropical Storm Helene is expected to strengthen into a powerful hurricane as it approaches the Gulf Coast of Florida, particularly near the Big Bend. Showers and thunderstorms will become more frequent and widespread, leading to heavy rainfall, damaging hurricane-force winds, and significant flooding across the west coast of Florida and the Florida Panhandle. As the system weakens and moves northward, heavy rains are anticipated across Florida and the southeastern U.S. from Thursday into Friday.



ARIZONA

Excessive heat will persist throughout the weekend due to a strong high-pressure system. Daily afternoon highs will soar into the 100s, peaking at 112-113°F in Thermal through Friday, before cooling slightly by Sunday. Morning lows will remain in the 70s, accompanied by light, predominantly westerly winds.

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Grop Updates

In the aftermath of the devastation from Hurricane Helene growers in the Southeast will continue to assess damage across the numerous regions. Farming operations from Florida to Tennessee have been impacted by this system. Areas of Tennessee and North Carolina are dealing with catastrophic flooding and power outages along with road and infrastructure damage. The remaining fall dry vegetable crops, especially the tomato crops, in these regions are likely a complete loss. There are many regional farming operations that have been impacted and it will take some time for crop assessments to take place. Of greatest concern currently are the upcoming fall crops in Northern Florida (Quincy) and South Georgia that are set for harvest around mid-October. In Georgia the eastern part of the state took the brunt of the storm damage with areas to the west impacted to a lesser degree. We anticipate quality challenges such as wind scarring and in the long-term plants may see a reduction in yields due to bloom drops and fields needing to be replanted. In Florida early reports expect minimal damage as many crops have yet to be planted, with Helene delaying current plantings for about a week. It is still too early to determine the full extent of damage as crop assessments continue.

Out west a significant heat wave will continue to impact most of California and the Southwestern Desert growing regions this week with temperatures 10-20 degrees This heat wave will reach all the way to the coastal growing regions of the Santa Maria and Salinas Valleys that supply much of the late fall acreage. This will not help with the disease, insect and mildew problems in these fields. We will have to wait and see how this heat impacts the late season fields in these regions.

The Tropics remain active, and we are monitoring a system moving into the Gulf of Mexico this week as well as systems in the Atlantic. Given the recent weather events Fall supplies look to be problematic given the multiple regions impacted and numerous crops.
