

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Asparagus supplies are extremely limited on both coasts due to challenges with Mexican production from extreme heat, leading to quality issues and elevated markets, despite steady Peruvian production.

Blackberries: This item is currently in very short supply, but increased production from Santa Maria, Oxnard, and Central Mexico by early October is expected to alleviate the shortage..

Blueberries: As we approach the end of a monthlong supply gap, production from Central Mexico, Peru, and Baja is set to increase in early October, but quality of remaining PNW fruit is poor and limited Peruvian fruit is available on the East Coast, with demand still exceeding supply.

Oranges: Markets are strengthening with extremely limited supplies expected for the next 7-8 weeks due to low Valencia harvest levels, with contracts taking priority, and shippers facing reduced supplies and fair quality; offshore navels are being imported, but supplies will tighten as California's season ends and imports slow, with the domestic Navel crop expected to start in mid to late October.

Green Onions: High heat and humidity in northern Mexico are causing reduced supplies, leading to an elevated market expected to persist for the next few weeks.

CROP UPDATES

WEATHER

<u>Arizona</u> - Drier air moves in, causing cooler-than-normal temperatures through Friday. Over the weekend, temperatures will gradually warm, with highs in the upper 80s and lows in the mid 60s.

<u>California</u> - A low-pressure system is expected, bringing showers and below-average temperatures. Rain is expected through Thursday, with morning lows ranging from 40s to 50s. High pressure returns on Friday, causing a warming trend through the weekend.

Florida - A northward shift in the frontal boundary will bring showers and thunderstorms, mainly affecting South-Central and southern Florida. A cold front will cause isolated to scattered showers. The boundary will stall over the Florida Keys, confining showers to southern Florida and making them more isolated in northern Florida.

<u>Mexico</u> - Isolated showers and thunderstorms are expected through Friday morning in Central Mexico, with rain totals ranging from 0.02" to 0.20". Seasonally warm temperatures through September 22nd.

FREIGHT

Lighter freight volumes in the west coat region are causing supplier delays, prompting Pro*Fresh to rely on carrier partners for expedited freight delivery.

Asparagus supplies remain extremely limited on both coasts, struggling to meet demand. Mexican production is facing challenges due to extreme heat, leading to quality issues such as seeding and reduced yields. While Peruvian production remains steady, it is not enough to offset Mexico's shortfall. Expect the market to stay elevated over the next few weeks.

Avocados

Markets are improving as more Flora Loca crop is harvested. While 48ct and flats remain elevated, 60ct and 70ct are the peak sizes. With Mexico's Independence Day on September 16th, we may see a slight increase in market prices due to reduced harvest activity, but the impact should be minimal. Ripening times may be longer because of lower oil content, and much of the fruit will remain green as it ripens; the best way to gauge ripeness is by applying gentle pressure. #2 grade fruit will be limited throughout September, which is typical for the Flora Loca season. California supplies are nearly finished, and Peru has wrapped up as well.

<u>Citrus (Oranges)</u>

ALERT

Markets are strengthening, but expect extremely limited supplies for the next 7-8 weeks due to low harvest levels aimed at extending the short Valencia season. Valencias are available in the Central Valley and Riverside, but contracts take priority, and shippers are holding to averages and allocating due to reduced supplies. Several shippers will finish packing Valencias next week, further tightening supplies and driving up prices. Quality is fair, affected by the extreme heat, with reports of early decay, soft fruit, and skin breakdown. Offshore navels are being imported on both coasts, but supplies will tighten as California's season ends and import volumes slow. The domestic Navel crop is expected to start in mid to late October.



CALIFORNIA

A low-pressure system is arriving today, bringing a chance of showers and reinforcing below-average temperatures. Rain is expected through midday Thursday, but totals should be less than ¼". Morning lows will range from the low 40s to mid 50s, with daytime highs reaching the low 60s to upper 70s. High pressure is set to return on Friday, initiating a warming trend that will continue through the weekend. By then, temperatures will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s near the coast, upper 70s to low 90s in the coastal valleys, and upper 80s to mid 90s south of Soledad.



MEXICO

Isolated showers and a few thunderstorms are expected through Friday morning. Rain totals will generally range from 0.02" to 0.20" with higher amounts possible in some thunderstorms. Over the weekend, Central Mexico will experience mostly dry conditions. Temperatures will remain seasonably warm through September 22nd, with highs ranging from the mid 70s to mid 80s and lows from the upper 50s to mid 60s.



FLORIDA

Today, a frontal boundary will shift northward, bringing a few diurnally-driven showers and thunderstorms, mainly affecting South-Central and southern Florida. A cold front will move through the region from Thursday into Friday, resulting in isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms. By the weekend, the boundary will stall over the Florida Keys, confining showers primarily to southern Florida and making them more isolated in northern Florida. Temperatures will remain seasonably warm throughout the weekend. Highs will range from the mid 80s to near 90, with lows in the upper 60s to low 70s in most of northern Florida. In north-central to southern Florida, highs will range from the mid 80s to low 90s, with lows in the low to upper 70s. Winds will gust to around 15 mph or less in most of southern Florida through September 20th.



ARIZONA

Drier air will move in behind a passing low-pressure trough, leading to cooler-thannormal temperatures through Friday. Expect temperatures to gradually warm over the weekend. Highs will range from the upper 80s to mid 90s for the next three days, rising to the mid 90s to 104°F in most areas by Sunday. Morning lows will be in the mid 50s to mid 60s through Friday, warming to the 60s and low 70s by Sunday.

Freight Updates

Freight this week sees supplies becoming lighter in the west coat growing region. This lighter volume is creating shipping delays at supplier level. Cooler weather, along with a little rain/drizzle this week in the coastal regions of Central and Southern California will hinder growth rates and add a little moisture to the region. The cool down will be short lived however as high pressure returns over the weekend bringing above average temperatures once again next week.

We continue to see an increase in disease pressure showing up in lettuce, leafy green, and other fields in certain locations across the Salinas Valley impacting yields and quality. The continued deep marine layer in these coastal growing locations promote warm overnight temperatures. These warm, humid overnight conditions will increase mold, mildew, and disease pressure across the regions. Lettuce supplies are in generally good quality with some high core/seeders along with fringe and tip burns are also being reported in current leaf supplies.

Cole crops (Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cauliflower, Cabbage) continue to battle the Diamond back moth larvae, especially in broccoli and cabbage stands. These larvae are quite active and well camouflaged and can easily hide in the broccoli crown making it very difficult for growers to spot the embedded pests. Growers are bypassing some acreage due to infestation of this serious pest. Brussels sprouts, and cauliflower fields have also been impacted to a lesser degree. Warm temperatures have contributed to an increase of seeders in many of the brussels sprouts currently and this looks to continue for the near term.

To the south in the desert regions growers continue plantings for the winter season. Green onion supplies look to remine extremely light coming from the main growing region of Mexicali due to hot temperatures reducing yields in the region. These regions supply most of the current production and will take weeks to recover at a minimum.
