

#### **MARKET ALERTS**

**Blackberries:** As the West Coast season ends, a planting gap is forming while we wait for increased Mexican production in October.

**Blueberries:** Pacific Northwest production is ending with weak-quality storage crops. Small volumes of Peruvian produce are arriving by air, with ocean shipments starting in mid-October. Peak Peruvian season is November-December, and CMex production will ramp up in early October.

Raspberries: West Coast and Baja production have ended, creating a supply gap similar to blackberries. CMEX production is expected to increase in October.

Oranges: Markets are strengthening with increased school demand. Valencia harvests are low, with supplies peaking in Central Valley (56ct+) and Riverside (88ct). Offshore navels are an alternative. Domestic Navels will start mid to late October.

**Cucumbers:** Volumes are down due to winding down Eastern local deals and light supplies from Baja. Crops will transition south, with the NC region starting next week. Nogales cucumbers are expected in October.

**Green Onions:** Remains very limited due to supply issues in Mexico caused by high temperatures. Supplies are expected to stay tight through next week.

### **SEPTEMBER 4, 2024**

#### **CROP UPDATES**

High pressure is expected to bring hot temperatures to the west coast, with excessive heat warnings for Southern California and the Southwestern Desert regions. Coastal California growing regions, such as Oxnard, Santa Maria, and Salinas Valley, will experience summer temperatures, while inland regions will see hotter temperatures and warm overnight temperatures. #### WEATHER

Arizona - Daily average temperatures in Arizona and southeast California will be 10-15° above normal, with highs ranging from 110-116° and lows in the 80s. A slight cooldown is expected on Friday, with maximum temperatures dropping to 100s by Sunday afternoon. Winds will remain light and variable.

<u>California</u> - High pressure and shallow marine layer forecasts above-average temperatures through work week, with morning lows in the 40s, daytime highs in the 70s, 90s, and 108s.

Florida -Northern Florida faces stalled frontal boundary, with scattered showers and thunderstorms in Central and Southern Florida. Rainfall totals range from 0.10" to 0.35".

Mexico - Isolated showers and thunderstorms are expected over the weekend, with rain chances decreasing. Precipitation ranges from 0.02" to 0.20". Seasonally warm temperatures with highs in the mid-70s to mid-80s.

#### **FREIGHT**

Freight from the Pacific Northwest is active as new crop Potato supply increases, while Florida is slowing down for the 24-25 season, with backhauls being difficult.

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#### **Apples**

The new crop harvest is ongoing, with Granny Smith, Red Delicious, and Fuji varieties being added this week. The market is generally trending higher as inventories remain light across nearly all varieties.

#### <u>Asparagus</u>

Mexico's asparagus supply continues to favor smaller sizes, while Peruvian volumes are improving but also trending smaller. Harvesting has begun in Southern Peru. The market remains strong for large, XL, and Jumbo sizes, with good quality reported from both Peru and Mexico.

#### **Avocados**

Markets are improving as more Flora Loca crop is harvested. Prices remain high for 48ct and larger due to peak sizes being 60/70ct. Unlike usual, the Flora Loca market isn't flooded because oil content must be at least 24% before harvesting, and recent rains have slowed dry matter progression. Ripening times will be longer due to lower oil content, and #2 grade fruit will be limited through August and September. The Negra crop is winding down, with limited availability. California supplies are dwindling and will last through August, while Peruvian supplies are also decreasing. Flexibility on country of origin and size is needed, and orders should be placed with as much lead time as possible. Suppliers are monitoring averages, and anything above may be subject to availability.

#### **Bell Peppers**

Markets are fairly steady with good overall supply. The new crop from Arroyo Grande has started, offering great quality and large sizes. Colored bell pepper supplies remain limited as Canada wraps up their season. Adequate crossings are coming through McAllen from Central Mexico, and demand for field pack colored peppers from California remains strong.

#### **Berries (Blueberries)**

Production in the Pacific Northwest is nearly finished, with only modified atmosphere storage crops remaining. The quality of this storage crop is weak, with softer fruit showing signs of aging. A small volume of Peruvian produce is being flown into New Jersey and Los Angeles, with ocean containers expected to begin arriving in mid-October. The peak season for Peruvian crops will be in November and December. Meanwhile, the CMex season is expected to ramp up in early October.

#### Citrus (Grapefruit)

#### Citrus (Lemons)

Fruit is peaking at 115ct and larger sizes, while 165ct and smaller sizes will remain extremely tight through the summer until District 3 starts in mid/late September. Markets for 140ct and smaller sizes will stay strong. With District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) finished, District 2 (Oxnard/Ventura County) is now the main growing region, focusing on larger fruit. Offshore lemons on the West Coast are starting to relieve some pressure on domestic supplies.

#### Citrus (Limes)

The market is experiencing a significant escalation, with FOB prices jumping dramatically this week and continuing to trend higher. Availability has sharply declined, with crossings through McAllen, Texas falling well below normal levels.

#### Citrus (Oranges)

Markets are strengthening with increased school demand. Harvests remain low as we aim to extend the short Valencia season. Valencias are currently available in the Central Valley (peaking on 56ct+) and Riverside (peaking on 88ct). Contracts are prioritized, and some shippers are allocating supplies due to reduced availability. Offshore navels are available on both coasts as an alternative, or consider switching to other commodities like apples or grapes. The Domestic Navel crop is expected to start in mid to late October, with Valencia Brix around 12.

#### **Pineapples**

Pineapple supplies are improving, with normal levels expected for weeks 38-40. Contracted business remains a priority. Costa Rican pineapples face challenges due to insufficient rainfall in the tropics and port delays on the West Coast affecting loading schedules. Larger fruit is hard to find, though Mexican supplies are improving despite lower crossings compared to last year.

#### **Stone Fruit**

Peaches, plums, and nectarines are in lighter supply due to hotter-thannormal summer temperatures. The peach and nectarine seasons are likely to be shorter, ending in September rather than October. Although plums are also affected by the heat, late-season varieties should extend their availability into November. The pomegranate season is gaining momentum, while the kiwi market is active due to slower packing of controlled atmosphere fruit. Expect kiwi prices to rise over the next few weeks.

#### **CALIFORNIA**

Strong high pressure and a shallow marine layer will lead to above-average temperatures through the end of the work week. Morning lows will range from the upper 40s to low 60s on Monday, with daytime highs reaching the mid 70s to mid 80s near the coast, low 90s to 101 in the coastal valleys, and 100-108 south of Soledad.



#### **MEXICO**

Isolated showers and thunderstorms are expected through the weekend, with rain chances decreasing as the weekend progresses. Precipitation totals are likely to range from 0.02" to 0.20" through Sunday. Temperatures will stay seasonably warm over the next five days, with highs in the mid 70s to mid 80s through Thursday and cooling to the low 70s to low 80s from Friday through Sunday. Slightly cooler and drier air is expected over the weekend.



### **FLORIDA**

A frontal boundary will remain stalled over northern Florida through the weekend, with minimal southward movement. Expect scattered showers and thunderstorms in Northern and Central Florida, while Southern Florida will see more isolated shower activity. Rainfall totals are expected to range from 0.10" to 0.35" in most showers, with 1" to 2" possible in some thunderstorms.



### **ARIZONA**

Under a strong high-pressure ridge, daily average temperatures will be about 10-15° above normal today and tomorrow. Most fields in Arizona will experience highs ranging from 110-116°, while southeast California will see temperatures between 115-120°. Morning lows will be in the 80s for most fields over both days. A slight cooldown is expected to start on Friday and continue through the weekend, with maximum temperatures dropping to the 100s by Sunday afternoon. Winds will remain mostly light and variable throughout this period.

# Freight Undates

Freight this week from the Pacific Northwest is very active as new crop Potato supply ramps up. Expect truck capacity to build as that region continues into the new season. Florida is starting in a slow way for the 24-25 season with some imports and local crops starting. For now, Florida is very slow and backhauls out of the state are very difficult.

High pressure building out west will bring another round of hot temperatures to the west coast with excessive heat warnings for Southern California and the Southwestern Desert regions. In the Coastal California growing regions of Oxnard, Santa Maria and the Salinas Valleys the rollercoaster of summer temperatures will continue across these growing regions along with the coastal marine layer especially for fields near the coast. Inland regions will continue to see some hotter temperatures and generally warm overnight temperatures as we move into fall.

There have been some reports of disease pressure showing up in lettuce, leafy green, and other fields in certain locations across the valley. The continued warm, humid overnight conditions will increase mold, mildew, and disease pressure including sclerotinia, fusarium and downy mildew which are caused by a soil-inhabiting fungus. The fungi can persist for long periods in the soil and is spread by wind or equipment in the moist humid conditions. Compared to last summer we are seeing less disease pressure at the moment, however it is not a matter of if but when we will see an increase in disease pressure. Some seeders along with fringe and tip burn are also being reported in current leaf supplies. Tip burn occurs when environmental conditions favor rapid succulent growth, warm temperatures, excessive soil moisture and warm overnight temperatures with high relative humidity. Broccoli supplies are showing some bead discoloration along with a branchy crown. The tender spring mix and cilantro have also been impacted by the heat and warm, humid overnight temperatures with some discoloration and a weaker texture. These warmer temperatures allow for continued growth overnight in these stands impacting texture and shelf life, especially in fresh cut/processed items. Processed items will continue to have a reduced shelf life and should be used as quickly as possible, keeping a close eye on rotation.

To the south in the desert regions growers are currently planting for the winter season. Very hot temperatures across Northern Mexico along with strong winds have drastically reduced green onion supplies from the main growing region of Mexicali. These regions supply most of the current production and will take weeks to recover at a minimum.







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
