MARKET ALERTS

Blackberries: The market is very tight, but improved supplies are expected by the end of October, mainly from central Mexico.

Blueberries: Demand currently exceeds supply, but we expect improved imports from Peru and Central Mexico by late October, gradually increasing through November.

Oranges: As the Valencia season nears its end, markets remain strong, but supplies will be extremely limited in the coming weeks, with contracts taking priority. Many shippers have completed packing, leading to gaps before the domestic navel season begins around October 21st. Quality is fair, with reports of decay and soft fruit due to extreme heat.

Tomatoes: Prices are expected to rise over the next 3-4 weeks as production shifts to Florida. The crops in Tennessee and North Carolina were significantly affected by Hurricane Helene, causing Northern Florida to lag 1-2 weeks behind schedule. A new hurricane is approaching the Tampa area, a key tomato-growing region. Due to high demand in the East, sourcing has moved to McAllen, Baja, and California, driving up prices for round and Roma tomatoes. Meanwhile, grapes are in moderate supply, but prices are beginning to firm.

OCTOBER 9, 2024 CROP UPDATES

The heat wave will ease in California's coastal regions, but desert areas will stay unseasonably warm, affecting leafy greens with heat-related defects. Florida braces for Hurricane Milton, delaying plantings and threatening crops already in the ground, especially in Central Florida. <u>Read more</u>

<u>Arizona</u> - Temperatures will remain above seasonal averages through the weekend, with highs in southwest Arizona and southeast California reaching 100-106°F, and lows in the mid-60s to 70s. Light southwesterly winds prevail.



All major apple varieties have transitioned into new crop harvest, with the exception of Pink Lady apples, which will start at the end of the month. Overall volume is down across nearly all varieties compared to last year, particularly for Granny Smiths. Additionally, size profiles are skewing larger, which poses a challenge for the food service industry, as smaller sizes are in high demand due to competition with retail bag packs. The one exception is small Galas, where there are currently ample supplies of 125/138s.

Nectarines are effectively finished for the season, while peaches are expected to wrap up by the end of this month. Pluots are nearly complete, although one larger shipper will continue shipments into November. Plums remain in good supply and will be available through November. Asian pears have begun harvesting and are in healthy volumes, with supplies expected to last into January. Domestic kiwi is now available, with a steady market at higher prices.





Expect prices to rise over the next 3-4 weeks as we transition to Florida production. Tennessee and North Carolina crops were largely impacted by Hurricane Helene, leaving Northern Florida 1-2 weeks behind schedule. Another hurricane is currently tracking towards the Tampa area, which is a significant growing region for tomatoes in Ruskin and Palmetto. As a result of heavy demand in the East, sourcing has shifted to McAllen, Baja, and California, leading to escalating prices, particularly for round and Roma tomatoes. Grapes remain in moderate supply for now, but prices are already starting to firm up.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Temperatures will cool across the region as high pressure weakens through Thursday. Morning lows are expected to range from the mid-40s to upper 50s, with daytime highs reaching the mid-60s to mid-70s near the coast and mid-70s to mid-90s further inland. A low-pressure system moving north on Friday will deepen the marine layer and bring max temperatures closer to seasonal averages, with coastal highs in the low to upper 60s, upper 60s to low 80s in the coastal valleys, and low to mid-80s south of King City.



MEXICO

Aside from a few light, isolated showers, expect dry weather through October 12th. Temperatures will remain relatively stable, with highs in the low 70s to low 80s most days leading into the weekend. Overnight lows will range from the low 50s to low 60s this morning, dropping to the upper 40s to mid-50s from Thursday through Saturday morning.



FLORIDA

Hurricane Milton, a highly dangerous storm, is moving east and poised to significantly impact Florida. Destructive winds, heavy rainfall, and life-threatening storm surges are anticipated. Milton is expected to approach the state and make landfall late today into early Thursday, before traversing across Florida and entering the Atlantic later in the day.



ARIZONA

A slight cooling trend is expected through the weekend, but temperatures will remain above seasonal averages. Highs today will reach 100-106°F in southwest Arizona and 105-109°F in southeast California, cooling to the 90s-100s by Sunday afternoon. Morning lows will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s today, with only a minor decrease throughout the weekend. Light southwesterly winds will prevail from Wednesday to Thursday, shifting to westerly on Friday, while low humidity levels continue.

Grop Updates

The extended heat wave out west will ease for the coastal growing regions of California mid-week with seasonal temperatures expected into next week. The Imperial and Yuma Desert growing regions will remain 10-15 degrees above normal as unseasonably warm conditions look to persist into the third week of October. Highs in the lower 100s with lows in the 70s look to continue for the foreseeable future. The roller coaster of temperatures typical of fall look to continue in the coastal valleys of California. In the Salinas Valley the recent heat has taken a toll on current and remaining acreage in the valley. Iceberg, romaine and leafy green fields will see an increase in heat related defects including fringe and internal burn, twist/irregular shape and seeders, while also contributing to a weaker, dehydrated texture and lesser overall shelf life. Mildew and disease pressure are also taking a toll on current production with some fields being left behind due to poor quality. Insect pressure will continue to be a problem especially diamondback moth larvae in the broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower fields.

On the processing side extreme heat can cause physiological changes in the plants causing leaf sensitivity and weaker overall texture. This can result in increased mechanical damage and bruising during harvest and processing. Processed leafy green items will also likely see an increase in discoloration and breakdown showing up in the bag affecting shelf life. Spinach, spring mix and the tender baby leaf items tend to be most susceptible to weather fluctuations due to being harvested at a very young stage. The spring mix and tender leaf items will continue to show some yellowing, discoloration and breakdown in the bag along with weaker texture and lesser shelf life due to the growing conditions in the region.

We will have to wait and see how this heat impacts the numerous crops impacted in the long term.

In the aftermath of the devastation from Hurricane Helene Florida is bracing for another Major Hurricane. Milton is expected to reach landfall as a category 4 or strong category 3 near the Tampa Bay region. Milton is forecast to remain a hurricane as it crosses the Florida Peninsula exiting into the Atlantic as a category 1 hurricane on Thursday. Central Florida will take the brunt of this storm however it will bring wide-ranging impacts across the Southeast. Many farming operations in Florida had already delayed planting of tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, squash and eggplant following Helene and will wait until Milton passes before resuming plantings. There is also concern about the iceberg, romaine and cabbage acreage across Central Florida that is already in the ground. At this point growers in Florida and the Southeast are bracing for impact and will once again begin to assess the damage across the numerous regions in the aftermath of Milton.
