

Avocados: Markets are elevated due to limited holiday harvests, but supply should stabilize in a week as Mexico resumes normal harvesting. Sizes remain similar, with 60ct and smaller peaking. Please submit orders with ample lead

Raspberries: Harvest yields have decreased in Central Mexico and Baja, leading to fewer volume deals and limited open market availability.

Celery: Demand and availability remain moderate, with smaller sizes more abundant in Southern California and Yuma. Quality is above average with minimal seeder issues, and escalated pricing on value-added items has

Cantaloupe: Offshore melons are facing a supply-demand imbalance due to lower yields in Guatemala and port delays, worsened by Tropical Storm Sara. Market supply is extremely limited, and quality may suffer from longer transit times. Triggered pricing will continue through Week 9 (Feb 24th, 2025), with no shortterm relief expected from Honduras, Costa Rica, or Mexican cantaloupes.

Honeydew: Honeydew prices are high due to limited supply, port delays, and reduced yields from Tropical Storm Sara. Triggered pricing continues through Week 9 (Feb 24th, 2025), with no relief expected from Honduras, Costa Rica, or Mexican cantaloupes. Watermelons are recommended as a substitute for food cut processing.

Pears: Pears are in tight supply until mid-July, with Bartletts ending by February and Anjou prices rising.

CROP UPDATES

Cold temperatures in the Southwestern desert growing regions are delaying harvests and reducing supplies. Quality issues such as wind damage, blistering, discoloration, and smaller head sizes are expected. Tender leaf, spinach, and spring mix will also see vellowing and shorter shelf life. While early damage is minimal, freeze damage is expected to increase, potentially causing supply shortages due to slower growth rates. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona -Warming trend through Friday with light showers expected this weekend. Rainfall of ¼ inch or less, with no rain in Yuma. Morning lows rising to the 30s and 40s by Friday.

California - High pressure brings below-average lows and above-average highs. Temperatures will range from the mid 20s to mid 30s in the morning, with highs in the 60s to 70s. Light rain is expected this weekend, with total precipitation under ½ inch.

Florida - Cold temperatures, rain, freezing rain, and sleet in northern Florida, with snow north of I-10. Light rain in central and southern Florida from Wednesday to Thursday. Subfreezing temperatures through the weekend with gusty winds.

Mexico - Cool mornings with frost through Thursday and Saturday, milder on Friday and Sunday. Lows in the 30s to 40s, highs in the 70s to 80s, with dry weather through January 26th.

FREIGHT

Lettuce Ice this week is causing delays at supplier level in Yuma. We are seeing below average temperatures along the coastal valleys, also creating a slow down in supplies and longer wait times for trucks. Expect this pattern to remain for the next week.



MARKET ALERTS

Pineapples: The pineapple market is strong, with high demand for Costa Rican pineapples. Limited supply due to lower yields from heavy rainfall is expected until mid-April, and crownless pineapples are in high demand.

Squash: Squash supplies are limited due to cold weather, causing reduced volume and higher prices, especially for yellow timely order fulfillment, with cold temperatures expected through the

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Apples

The apple market is expected to remain steady throughout January, with one notable exception: Honeycrisp apples. This variety is down approximately 38% compared to last year, and prices are expected to continue rising. Overall, the Washington crop is skewing toward larger sizes, leading to limited availability of smaller foodservice sizes, especially in Granny Smith and Fuji varieties.

Tropical Storm Sara has further impacted yields, adding pressure on markets as growers strive to meet commitments. Market supply is extremely limited, and quality may be affected due to longer transit times. Triggered pricing has been implemented on some items and is expected to continue through Week 9 (week of Feb 24th, 2025). Relief from Honduras and Costa Rica is not expected in the short term, and Mexican cantaloupes from Nogales and McAllen are also in very limited supply.

Pears remain in tight supply and are expected to stay that way until at least mid-July when California's new crop of Bartletts becomes available. This year's Washington crop is down by 25-50%, depending on the region and variety. Bartletts are winding down and should be nearly finished by February. Bosc saw the most significant decrease in volume and will remain in high demand until the new crop arrives. Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

High pressure and light offshore winds continue to dominate the region, resulting in below-average lows and above-average highs. Morning temperatures will range from the mid 20s to mid 30s, with daytime highs reaching the low 60s to mid 70s. As the high pressure strengthens on Thursday, minimum temperatures will rise to the upper 20s to low 40s, while maximum temperatures will climb to the mid 60s to upper 70s. A low-pressure system is expected to move in by Saturday, bringing a slight chance of rain, with total precipitation over the weekend expected to remain under ½ inch.



MEXICO

Expect cool mornings with patchy frost today, Thursday, and Saturday, while Friday and Sunday will be milder. Lows will range from the low 30s to low 40s, rising to the upper 30s to mid 40s by Sunday. Highs will be in the low 70s to low 80s through Thursday, mid 60s to mid 70s on Friday, and low 70s to low 80s over the weekend. Dry weather is expected through January 26th.



FLORIDA

Cold temperatures with rain, freezing rain, and sleet are expected as far south as Ocala and into northern Florida. Snow may also occur north of I-10 from Tuesday evening to early Wednesday. Light cold rain showers are possible in central and southern Florida from Wednesday to Thursday. Subfreezing morning temps are forecast for northern and parts of south-central Florida through the weekend. Dry and cooler conditions will settle in by Friday, with winds gusting 20-30 mph through Friday across southeast Florida and Tampa Bay.



ARIZONA

A slight warming trend will continue through Friday as a high-pressure ridge builds. This weekend, the first rain in weeks is expected as a cold front moves in from the northwest, bringing scattered light showers to the Coachella Valley Saturday afternoon, spreading into central AZ and Imperial Valley late Saturday into Sunday. Total accumulation should range from a tenth to ¼ inch for most valleys, with no rain expected in Yuma. Morning lows will rise from the mid 20s to mid 30s today, to the 30s to low 40s by Friday and Saturday.

Grop Appdates

Cold temperatures in the Southwestern desert growing regions are forecast to continue into next week following the heavy wind event last week. This will delay harvesting in the region until temperatures warm sufficiently for harvests to resume. This in turn will lessen overall supplies in the chain during these cold mornings.

These desert fields will see very cold morning temperatures with moderate to heavy lettuce ice across the region. The leafy green fields will likely begin to show some wind and fringe burn, feathering/epidermal peeling, blister, and discoloration in upcoming harvests. Along with blister and epidermal peel and blister you can expect to see lighter color and carton weights and smaller head size as growers trim out damaged outer leaves.

The tender leaf, spinach and spring mix items will likely show an increase in yellowing and discoloration along with weaker texture and lesser shelf life due to these growing conditions. It is important to keep your rotations in check as overall quality and shelf life of many crops, especially processed items, will be challenged in the near term.

Early field reports indicate the damage does not seem to be too extensive at the moment, however we expect to see an increase in freeze damage in the upcoming harvests as damage begins to show up in the fields. This is mainly due to an abundance of product in the fields due to the nice weather in December increasing supplies allowing growers to bypass some affected acreage. These very cold temperatures currently will drastically slow growth rates in the desert regions possibly causing some supply shortages in the future.







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
